This special issue on “**Current Concepts in Diagnosis and Management of Endometrial Cancer**” will be focusing on the latest development in endometrial cancer. **Endometrial cancer** is any kind of malignancies that arise from the endometrium, or lining, of the uterus. Endometrial cancers are the most common gynecologic cancers in developed countries and the incidence is on a slow rise every year. The most common subtype, endometrioid adenocarcinoma, typically occurs within a few decades of menopause, is associated with obesity, excessive estrogen exposure, often develops in the setting of endometrial hyperplasia, and presents most often with vaginal bleeding. As one of the most important research fields of human health, **endometrial cancer** is of great attractions to researchers.

In this special issue, we intend to invite front-line researchers and authors to submit original researches and review articles on exploring **endometrial cancer**. Potential topics include, but are not limited to:
